Methodology

Data Entry

Suggested definition

The total number of admissions to the agency's correctional institutions as the result of a legal decision made by the courts or other authority, such as a parole board. This number should include people entering the facility to serve a sentence for the first time as well as people returning to prison, either for a new sentence or a supervision revocation due to a new offense or condition violations. The number of admissions is based on the number of events where a person was accepted into the custody of a state facility, not the number of individual people who entered the facility. Therefore, if the same person was admitted to prison three times in a fiscal year, they would count as three admissions in the numbers below. Do not include people returning to facilities after a court hearing or other temporary absences such as a doctor visit or work release, or people moving from one agency facility to another.




