Background of AB 236 (2019)

- The Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice conducted an extensive review of data and research
 - Released a report of findings and recommendations in January 2019
- AB 236 was drafted based on these recommendations
- Legislation passed in June 2019 and the majority of changes became effective in July 2020

Provide coaching

Make adjustments

FULL IMPLEMENTATION

"Business as usual"

Measure performance

Monitor quality and adherence to policy

Continue to train and coach staff

Goal: Focus Prison Resources on Those Who Have Committed Serious and Violent Offenses

- Restructures penalties for drug offenses based on weight and substance
- Made changes to the habitual criminal statute
- Raised the felony theft threshold
- Distinguishes penalties for burglary offenses based on location (i.e. motor vehicles, retail stores, outbuildings, and residences)
- Made changes to medical release

Implementation Update: Board of Parole Commissioners




Goal 1 Outcomes

NDOC population dropped from 12,912 in July, 2019 to 10,002 in July, 2022

NDOC admissions have declined

NDOC releases have declined

Goal: Improvements to Community Supervision

- Requires training in evidence-based practices
- Establishes a system of graduated sanctions and revocation caps for responding to technical violations
- Requires the use of a risk and needs assessment
- Requires the use of case plans
- Reduces probation terms by tailoring to offense categories



Implementation Update: Nevada Parole and Probation




AB 236 Implementation August 2022

Goal 2 Outcomes

NDOC admissions for probation violations with no new convictions dropped between 2017-2021

NDOC admissions for parole violations with no new convictions increased in that same period

Goal: Strengthen Behavioral Health Responses

- Expanded eligibility for specialty courts
- Requires training on interaction with those with behavioral health needs
- Standardizes crisis intervention training for law enforcement
- Creates a behavioral health field response grant program

Goal: Minimizing Barriers to Reentry

- Requires NDOC to develop a reentry plan for individuals prior to release
- Ensures every releasing individual has certain essential items

Goal: Sustaining the Reforms

- Requires ongoing criminal justice data collection and analysis
- Requires the calculation of averted costs and prioritizes reinvestment in reentry, behavioral health, and transitional housing
- Establishes a local coordinating council to report on community needs and identify grant opportunities for local agencies



Implementation Update: Nevada Department of Sentencing Policy



Goal 5 Outcomes

- The Nevada Sentencing Commission and the Department of Sentencing Policy have released reports as required by AB 236
- The Local Justice Reinvestment Coordinating Council has been created and is meeting

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
