My name is Jesus Benitez #80778.
I have been incarcerated for 19 years
for Robberies I committed In 2003.

Although, I do realize that Prison
is a way to keep communities safe and
deter crime. However giving a first time
offender 156 year sentence for Robberies
is "Brutal" Especially since the weapon that
was being used in these Robberies was recovered
and Proven to be a (Glock 17) "Look Alike",
with all the parts for firing the look alike
weapon missing. Please see the attached
Sentencing Transcripts and The Impounded
Firearm Information Sheet.

I realize that committing crimes such
as Robberies have harsh sentences. But, should
Category "B" Robberies carry harsher Penalties
than more serious Category "A" crimes such as
Murder or Rape.

I've attached some paperwork
that I have recently submitted to the
Pardons Board but, with the large amounts
of applications they receive I have not
been very hopeful that my application be given
much consideration. → other side

My hope in showing you this paperwork is that there are some of us who are given virtual life sentences for Category "B" crimes.

Essentially, what that means is that there is no chance that someone like myself could be rehabilitated and the only solution is to give him a 50 to 156 year sentence which would ensure that the person die behind bars. When you take in to consideration that robbery carries a 2 year minimum, Many of my victims were behind bullet Proof glass, The weapon used in all my Robberies was fake, then I think you may agree that the sentence I received of 50 to 156 years is more than harsh.

I hope that you read this and share it at your next meeting with the public and amongst yourselves. If there is anybody there or agencies, attorneys that are willing to help get me a hearing at the Pardons Board please inform. Other than that please use my paperwork for any use that you see fit.

When I was young I never considered how my actions affect others. I only cared about my own interests with a sense of entitlement and arrogance, which I believe was a product of a lack of discipline. This lack of consequences fueled my criminal pattern for many years, starting at the age of 14 and ending at the age of my arrest. It is such a shame that it took such horrible acts for me to get the consequences and discipline that I deserved. However, this was the turning point my life.

The process of change is not instant. It takes time and honesty about who you are: the good, the bad, where you are in life and where you want to go. This process of change still continues to this day. I keep a constant reflection on the past, present, and future along with who I was, who I am, and who I want to become...I feel that it is important to remember the mistakes of the past, but if you only view me as the person I was in the past then you will never see me as the person I have worked so very hard to become.

I believe actions speak louder than words, so when I say that I am sorry, remorseful, or that I have taken responsibility for my actions, I hope that I put some weight behind my words by abstaining from drugs and alcohol for the past 19 years, which was a contributing factor to my actions, and I've taken the appropriate classes that have taught me how to avoid situations that can lead me to another offense.

Robbery is a serious offense and although the weapon that was used on many if not all the robberies was not operable (all components for firing were missing) see exhibits, it still does not take away the fact that I terrified many people and took advantage of them by pointing a gun that they thought was lethal.

I try my very best to live with what I have done and although it is very important to remember the mistakes of the past it is also very important to press forward to the greater accomplishments of the future so, try and live honorably, be humble, have compassion, and give this great life a smile every minute of every day.
