Here's How a Parolee Gets a

Temporary Revocation



Alleged technical violations

NPP uses graduated sanctions in response to technical violations.
Applying the matrix, at some point NPP may seek a temporary revocation for technical violations.



Parolee arrested



Upon alleged technical violations, parolee is arrested and placed in custody in a jail. NPP holds a probable cause inquiry within 15 days and then submits violation report and retake warrant to Parole Board.



Parolee transferred to NDOC



If Parole Board signs retake warrant, NPP submits warrant to jail and Parolee is transferred to NDOC.



Revocation Hearing



Parole Board holds revocation hearing to determine if Parolee will be temporarily revoked. Hearing held within <u>60 days</u> of Parolee's return to NDOC.



Parolee serves temporary revocation



Parolee serves temporary revocation in NDOC facility and then returns to supervision. (30 days for a 1st, 90 days for a second, 180 days for a 3rd, and full revocation for a 4th.)

For a 1st temporary revocation (30 days) a parolee spent an average of<u>69 days</u> in NDOC

Revise Response to Technical Violations

- Remove 30 day temporary revocation
- Authorize NPP to impose jail (1-10 days) or electronic monitoring (1-60 days) as graduated sanction
