# Statement of Costs Avoided

## December 2022

### STATUTORY REQUIREMENT

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This Statement of Costs Avoided is required pursuant to NRS 176.01347. The Nevada Sentencing Commission (Commission) must develop a formula to calculate for each fiscal year the amount of costs avoided by this State because of the enactment of Assembly Bill No. 236 (2019) (AB 236). The formula developed by the Commission must include, without limitation, a comparison of: (1) the annual prison population projections required by NRS 176.0129 for calendar year 2018; and (2) the actual number of persons in a Nevada Department of Corrections facility or institution.

The Commission is required to use the formula developed and submit:

- Not later than **December 1** of **each fiscal year**, a **statement** of costs avoided for the immediately preceding fiscal year

and

- Not later than **August 1** of **each even-numbered** year a **report** containing the projected amount of costs avoided and recommendations for reinvestment of those costs in order to reduce recidivism

### SUMMARY

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The 2019 final report of the Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice identified \$640 million in costs avoided by 2028 if the policies that led to AB 236 were enacted. At least \$470 million of the identified costs avoided are attributed to avoided correctional construction. This leaves \$170 million in other avoided correctional costs associated with housing a higher population of offenders until 2028. This rudimentarily calculates to \$21 million a year in costs avoided between 2020 (when AB 236 went into effect) and 2028. The Commission will identify \$21 million in costs avoided for each year the population is below the 2017 projections.

#### WHAT ARE COSTS AVOIDED?

Costs avoided are costs that an entity *would have* expended in the future. In the context of this report, costs avoided refer to spending that will be unnecessary because of the decrease in the prison population. Due to the varied costs associated with housing offenders in an NDOC facility, the costs avoided are *hypothetical* and *variable*.

Using the formula developed, the Nevada Sentencing Commission calculated that Nevada has avoided **\$42 million** due to the enactment of AB 236. As reported in the August 2022 Projected Amount of Costs Avoided Report, Nevada is projected to avoid another \$42 million during the

2023-2024 biennium. This means at least **\$42 million** has been avoided due to the enactment of AB 236 and can be reinvested in programs and treatment that will reduce recidivism.

## METHODOLOGY

In the August 2022 Projected Amount of Costs Avoided Report the Commission adopted a revised methodology for calculating costs avoided resulting from the enactment of AB 236. The methodology compares the following:

- 2017 JFA Prison Population Projections (these were the projections used for the legislatively approved phase of budgeting for the 2018-2020 biennium)
- Projected population of **15,074** if AB 236 **were not** enacted, as reported in the 2019 final report of the Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice
- Projected population of **14,008** if AB 236 **were** enacted, as reported in the 2019 final report of the Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice
- Current JFA Prison Population Projections
- Prison population as of June 30 of the applicable fiscal year(s)

The table below details the calculations based on the above comparisons.

### ***Notes about table***

- AB 236 was passed during the 2019 legislative session – February 2019 projections included as context of projections when bill was passed
- AB 236 went into effect July 1, 2020, so costs avoided were not calculated in early FY 2020
- Current prison population avoided by subtracting the actual total population as of June 30 of the applicable fiscal year from the 2017 projections
- Projected amount of costs avoided report published in August of each even-numbered year
- Statement of costs avoided published in December of each fiscal year
- \* = Indicates “baseline” population used rather than “worst case” in JFA Prison Population Projections February 2020
- ^ = Indicates projected population for December 31 of calendar year (CY) because June 30 projected population was not published in report
- \$21 million projected in costs avoided for FY23 and FY24 because AB 236 promised a population of 14,008 by 2028 and Nevada is on track to avoid well below 14,008
